Hurricane lan made landfall in southwest Florida September 28, 2022, a strong category 4 hurricane just shy of category 5. Ian was the deadliest hurricane to strike the state of Florida since 1935 and the second deadliest to strike the US, behind only Katrina in 2005. lan left over 2.7 million people without power. It created extensive road damage, severing connections between barrier islands and the mainland. It destroyed neighborhoods and business districts. Ian flooded cars, boats, homes, and buildings in the record high storm surge.

In response to this devastation, Luther Springs is partnering with Florida-Bahamas Synod, Lutheran Disaster Response, Faith Lutheran Church, Sarasota, and Peace Lutheran Church, Ft. Myers to offer Disaster Response Mission weeks at two sites for eight weeks this summer. Over 240 participants have already registered to help restore and rebuild Southwest Florida.

Pastor Rob Rose, FB Synod Assistant to the Bishop for Administration, said, "It is amazing how Lutherans answer the call to help. Time, treasure, and talent are flowing from the state and the nation to help answer the needs of those devastated by Hurricane Ian. Bishop Suarez is very supportive of NovusWay Ministries at Luther Springs and the ministry they are doing in Southwest Florida. Joel*, a 7th grader in Lutheridge's onsite program for middle school, came to camp holding a lot of insecurities. He did not just come with concerns about being at camp, but a whole host of anxiety he lived with every day of his life. Joel is a funny kid with lots of wit. He is the comedian in his family. He is smart. He is liked by others. He is also always worried about "EVERYTHING" going on in his School. friends. world. family, appearance, and more could bring him to his knees with worry. It was often debilitating. Joel met with a therapist about once a week and some headway would be made in his ability to manage the times he would spiral. It wasn't enough, though, as he was still often wrought with worry. It was harder for him to enjoy life the way his peers did at school.

Joel had very long curly hair. His curls are the kind that many folks with straight hair would do almost anything to have. He grew his hair all the way to the bottom of his back. Joel would use his long locks to often "hide" from others. It was like a shield from having anyone look into his eyes or protect him from having to look into theirs. His parents had no idea how he could even see the ball through his hair while playing soccer with his teammates.

Joel's parents dropped him off at camp on a Sunday and the Spirit went to work!

They did not talk with him at all that week. On the following Saturday they were excited to see how the experience was for him. How was his counselor? Did he make friends? Did he have fun? Like other camper parents, these were the questions they had when picking up Joel after a week of camp. Everything they needed to know (and then some) was communicated to them the moment they pulled up. Joel was there at Pioneer B Unit Lodge with many other campers talking and playing around their packed bags. What his parents saw amazed them. There he was with his hair tied up in a large ponytail. They could see his face. They could see his smile. He wanted to see, and he wanted to be seen. He was not hiding in his hair. That was the ONLY time they had ever seen him do that. They knew the moment they saw his hair that he had experienced a life-changing event on the mountain. His parents love Lutheridge, the staff and the Spirit's work here.

Joel's story is not the only camper transformation that we see each summer. Thousands of youth and adults have experienced the Spirit at work in their lives beyond the gates of Lutheridge. These experiences often lead them to become future counselors and seminarians. Your spiritual and financial gifts make camp possible and help to change lives like Joel's every day!

NOT JUST HORSING AROUND

In March 2020, Luther Ranch began its equestrian ministry with the goal of serving summer campers, retreat guests, and the local community through trail rides, weeklong overnight and day camps, clinics, and therapeutic and recreational riding lessons. Since an equestrian program can't exist without horses, a plea was made by Lutheranch Program Director Gretchen Ahrens asking for donated or leased horses, and thus, this special ministry began with four horses. Our equestrian ministry develops faith, trust, stability, physical strength, confidence, joy and leadership skills.

Maggie is one such special horse. She is leased to Lutheranch by her owner, Amy Sims. "My kind, beautiful Maggie mare is the sweetest horse ever! She was perfect for me - a timid rider - when I brought her home a few years ago. I knew immediately that she was careful and gentle beyond the norm. She helped me build confidence and before long we were riding all over the trails." When she's not riding horses, Amy is active duty military in a unique role for the State of Georgia. In 2021, she was asked to deploy to Afghanistan. "I was heartbroken imagining my big mares not being gently handled in my absence. After a particularly restless night, I woke to find Lutheranch's plea for free lease horses to use in their therapeutic riding program. I jumped on it!" Gretchen met Amy's horses and brought them to Lutheranch that summer. As troops were pulled out of Afghanistan, Amy did not end up deploying after all, yet she decided to allow Lutheranch to continue to use the mares. "It has been the most incredible experience! I see pictures of riders on my Maggie and I can tell her sweet energy is giving them joy. I didn't intend for her ministry to be long term, but I couldn't imagine taking her from the role she loves. I still ride her as often as my work allows and am thankful that when I'm not there she's loved and trusted by so many riders."



Maggie's ministry at Lutheranch has helped other riders grow in skill and confidence. She excels in helping therapeutic riding students. One particular student, Laney, has been riding for two years. According to her mom, Eden, "Laney loves working and riding with Maggie! Maggie is teaching Laney valuable lessons in how to trust when riding and has boosted Laney's confidence so much in the time she's been coming to Lutheranch. I can't wait to see how much she grows and learns!"



Maggie's ministry doesn't stop with riders. Lutheranch relies on roughly 20 volunteers to help with the care and feeding of horses and serving as horse leaders and sidewalkers in lessons.

Fifteen-year-old Abby came to Lutheranch for a trail ride and loved it so much she began taking lessons and volunteering. It didn't take long for her to develop a special bond



with Maggie. "Working with Maggie has changed the way I act around horses. Before, I was very nervous and anxious. Now I'm able to lead horses and feed them myself. I see God's presence in the Ranch horses like Maggie by how calm I feel around them - when they are calm that calmness gravitates to me. I have seen Maggie increase the confidence in all lesson kids she rides with!" Abby said.

Lutheranch currently has 10 program horses – four are owned by Lutheranch and six are leased. Their ministry is unique, but also expensive. Care for each of Lutheranch's program horses, including feed, vet and farrier bills, costs \$400 per month. A gift to the Lutheranch Equestrian Program directly impacts the lives of riders and horses. Often the families who need our program the most are burdened with realities that make lessons and therapeutic riding out of reach financially. Your donations help provide scholarships for riders who are unable to pay for lessons, facilities upkeep and improvements, and care for our horses, including veterinary visits, trimming and shoeing, grain, hay and shavings. You can also support this ministry by providing a full or partial sponsorship for a horse.

Pastor Rose explains, "Bishop and the Synod Council want to make sure the supplies and supports are in place as these amazing volunteers come down to do God's work with their hands."

There are two options for service weeks: one for high schoolers in Sarasota, FL and another for adults and campus ministry groups in Fort Myers, FL. Service weeks are Sunday through Friday June 4-9, 11-16, 18-23 and 25-30, and July 2-7, 9-14, 16-21 and 23-28. Work days are Monday through Thursday. After work each day, volunteers will spend time enjoying the beach, worship at sunset, and devotions in the sand.

Counselors will supervise youth at night and provide programming during non-work time, lead bible study and work alongside youth. Congregational leaders provide transportation for their groups, work at projects if able, join in programming and lead group time. This week includes a fun boat outing!

Peace Lutheran Church, Ft. Myers Adult Groups, Young Adults & Campus Ministries

Limited to 20 participants each week Sunday: arrival to meet other volunteers & prep for the work ahead Mon.-Thurs.: volunteers work on debris removal and rebuild projects Friday: breakfast, closing worship & departure

Counselors provide programming and lead bible studies each day.
Group leaders will provide transportation for their group, work at projects if they are able, and lead time with their groups. This group will also have a boat outing, depending on what is available.

Every week at camp was a new experience! From Backpacking through the Smokie mountains on the Appalachian trail to sliding down a natural rock waterfall, camp allowed me to not only participate in these activities but also lead and teach campers about them.
